We organized **96 home visits** to meet children, their guardians, and where possible, also neighbours, to monitor the

living conditions and overall well-being of the children, including physical and psychosocial aspects of their lives. Where the home visit was not possible, we contacted them via **50 phone calls**.

7 more students passed through their chance exam this quarter; Bisaya Guragain, Mui Lama Tamang, Amit Tamang, Lal Maya Tamang, Nisha Tamang, Pasang Tamang and Rupesh Nepali - 3 girls, 4 boys.

We would like to congratulate them and extend our best wishes for their further study.

Of the 18 students in total who sat their year 12 exams, 13 passed and 5 failed and are repeating.

Of the 13, 4 have gone on to start self (family)-funded bachelor's degrees in management – all girls!

Child Progress

Dawa Dolma Tamang



Dawa Dolma is studying in grade 6 at Arjun Basic School. She is living with her maternal grandparents, and her father is in Kathmandu working as a labourer. She lost her mother in the 2015 earthquake when she was four years old.

She was supposed to drop out of school as her grandparents were very old and sick most of the time and it was difficult for them to fulfil her educational needs.

Then she received an education scholarship from RUDEC/SCAI which enabled her to continue her studies. She studied hard and supported her grandparents in household work. She secured a first division (71%) in the first term examination.

She is very happy these days to attend her school and pursue her future dream.

Family Progress Sarita Tamang





Sarita has 3 sons and 1 daughter. Her husband works as a daily wage labourer in the village and sometimes goes to Kathmandu for work. Previously, she also

worked as a housewife and as a wage labourer in the village.

The income from her and her husband was not enough to provide for the family throughout the year, and she was always worried about her children. So daughter Ram Maya Tamang was selected for the education scholarship provided by RUDEC Nepal/SCAI Australia, and as part of that, Sarita also received various training opportunities as part of the livelihood development initiative.

After joining the cooperative, she has developed saving habits. She also participated in training sessions in vegetable farming, goat farming, and poultry farming provided by the organization.

With her new knowledge and skills gained from various training, she took a loan of 50,000 NPR from the cooperative and started poultry farming with 100 local chickens. She has also started a vegetable farming business in a tunnel. She has sold broiler chickens for NPR 100,000 and earned 8,000 NPR from vegetable farming so far.

Her annual income was only NPR 40,000 peviously and now her annual income is NPR 108,000, all because of her hard work, dedication, and the knowledge gained from the training.
