The Secondary Education Exam (SEE) was held from 20-28 March, and the result is expected to be published on 21 June 2025. A total of 31 students (15 repeat and 16 regular) sat from the Betini program this year.

Capacity Development/Trainings Life Skill Training

Life skill training was held for adolescents this quarter. The training provided an introduction to basic life skills, including communication, problem-solving,

decision-making, and interpersonal skills. A total of 8 adolescents (4 boys and 4 girls) participated in the life skills training from the Betini program. The training was held with the funding of the Dupcheshwor Rural Municipality as part of SCAI and government collaboration.

Peer Education

Peer education training was held for adolescents this quarter. The training raised awareness among young people about issues affecting teenagers and adolescents and provided guidance on how to cope with such challenges when they arise. A total of 6 adolescents (5 boys and 1 girl) participated in the peer education training as part of the Betini program.

The training was held with the funding of the Dupcheshwor Rural Municipality as part of SCAI and government collaboration.

Parental Education

A Parental education orientation was organised this quarter. The training raised awareness among the guardians/parents of sponsored children on how to provide appropriate parenting and how to handle adolescent issues with their children. A total of 12 guardians (3 men and 9 women) participated in this orientation as part of the Betini program.

The training was held with the funding of the Dupcheshwor Rural Municipality as part of the SCAI and government collaboration.

Dupcheshor Agricultural Cooperative (formed by the guardians) issued loans amounting to NPR 6,600,000 to 9 parents (6 women, 3 men) for the following purposes: 6 for buffaloes, 2 for goats, and 1 for tailoring. The guardians who had previously taken out loans have worked to enhance their livelihoods during this quarter.

Goat breeding & handover program

We continued to transfer goats from our guardians who received 2 female goats to the next guardians this quarter. In total, our guardian passed on 2 goats as part of the cycle of the pass-on program in this quarter.

Currently, **77** households have received **2** goats each. So far, **94** goats have been passed on to other families, and there are currently nearly **78** pregnant goats.

The centre continued to collect coop members' products and sell them to markets, providing a link between our farmers and the market. This quarter, the cooperative sold 12 pieces of *Khukuri* (traditional Nepali knife) made by one of our parents who is running an iron

smith business, **12 brooms and 43.5kg of buckwheat**. The cooperative also collected and sold other high-demand items, such as flowers and puja materials, to pilgrims who visit the Dupcheshwor temple, located near the cooperative shop/collection and sales centre.

Case stories Child Progress

Milan Tamang

Since he was 3 months old, Milan, now 16, has lived with his maternal grandmother after his parents separated. His father remarried, and his mother struggled with mental health, eventually leaving home. His maternal grandmother, a farmer, has faced many challenges in raising him, including financial difficulties. Although his grandmother has always prioritised his education, due to her financial condition, she could not afford the expenses related to it.

As a result, Milan struggled with irregular attendance at school because of a lack of educational materials.

In 2018, Milan was enrolled in an education scholarship program by

SCAI Australia, which provided support for his schooling and offered his grandmother access to various training opportunities. This support has had a significant positive impact on Milan's academic performance. **Milan now travels two hours daily to school and remains dedicated to his studies.**

In the second term of Class 8, Milan achieved **first division**. Milan is highly motivated to continue his education and is **determined to join the Nepal Army in the future**.

Family Progress

Dil Kumari Tamang

Dil Kumari, aged 48, is a hardworking mother. Her family includes five members: her mother-in-law, one son, two daughters, and herself.

Before starting her business in goat and buffalo farming, Dil Kumari had only worked in traditional farming and daily labour. With no other sources of income, it was a struggle to pay for household expenses and her children's education. With only a small amount of land, she often had to buy food. **Her husband,**

who worked as a wage labourer, tragically died in a stone-crushing accident while on the job. This loss made life even harder for Dil Kumari.

During these difficult times, Dil Kumari's children—Sancha Maya Tamang, Nema Maya Tamang, and Tchhiring Tamang were awarded an educational scholarship from SCAI Australia. This gave Dil Kumari the chance to take part in useful training programmes, such as "Start Improve Your Business", and skill development in vegetable farming, poultry farming, goat farming, and rearing. These trainings encouraged her to start her own business.

Inspired to build a better future Dil Kumari took a loan of 5,000 NPR from the cooperative set up by the project. She used this money to buy two mother goats. After a year, she sold the two male goats for 25,000 NPR, which she then used to buy a buffalo calf.

Now, Dil Kumari earns **100,000 NPR** a year from goat and buffalo farming. She **currently owns eight goats and two buffaloes.** Her hard work, along with the support from the project, has transformed her life and the future of her family.

Dil Kumari's has not only created a stable income for herself but has also helped her children to achieve their educational dreams.
